

Lifelong Learning April 14

Too often Kansas history seems to start with Coronado's trip through the state in 1541. For centuries before European arrival, Native people lived on the plains, and some left behind rock carvings on soft sandstone in the middle of the state.

Rich Buchanan is our April speaker and will present based on his book, Petroglyphs of the Kansas Smoky Hills. He will focus on these carvings, the people who made them, and what the carvings tell us about those people and their

relationship to the land. He will also discuss the challenges of dating and interpreting these carvings, the threats posed by erosion and vandalism, and the role of landowners whose property shelters these carvings.

Rex grew up in Rice County. He is the former director of the Kansas Geological Survey and the author of books about Kansas geology and water.

"Petroglyphs of the Kansas Smoky Hills" is part of Humanities Kansas Speakers Bureau, featuring humanities-based presentations designed to share stories that inspire, spark conversations that inform, and generate insights that strengthen civic engagement.

He will be speaking about hearing as we age. Different issues and solutions. Dr. Zafar is excited about how technology is rapidly improving how hearing loss can be helped. He will explain these strides and answer questions how it pertains to different situations and people.

Dr. Zafar has a Ph.D in Audiology, and is President of Audiology & Hearing Aid Services, Inc. His doctoral research investigated how individuals over the age of 65 years processed differences in timing and frequency of the speech signal. His design aimed at improving the performance and comfort of completely in the canal (CIC) hearing aids is being marketed and used on a national level.
