Marcia Sebree of the Peabody Historical Society will will speak at our Lifelong Learning on Monday, November 10, at 10AM, at the Parkside Apartments, 1 Park Avenue. She will share information on two orphan trains that came to Marion County in 1911.

Over 30 children were "placed out." Some of these children were picked up and removed from other homes on the way. She will share who and how all was arranged and what

happened to a few of the children.

Marcia has collaborated with the Orphan Train Museum in Concordia to track children adopted from the trains, part of a movement between 1854 and 1929 to relocate an estimated 250,000 orphaned, abandoned, or homeless children to rural communities in hopes of providing better lives for them.

CEO NOTES from *Stephanie Bryant*

I recently attended a PEAK conference in Manhattan Kansas. The PEAK program was developed by Kansas State University Center for Aging and stands for Promoting Excellent Alternatives in Kansas. It involves quality improvement for nursing homes through personcentered care. PEAK started in 2002 as a recognition and education program to encourage providers in Kansas to adopt culture change. The program is open to all long-term care providers in the state of Kansas. The program changed in 2012 to become PEAK 2.0, and adds a Medicaid pay-for-performance incentive program. Homes that engage in system changes to support person-centered care or who have demonstrated implementation of person-centered care receive financial incentives through Medicaid reimbursement. The program focuses on five domains essential to person-centered care: The Foundation, Resident Choice, Staff Empowerment, Home Environment, and Meaningful Life. Parkside was once a PEAK member in 2018, and we are taking the necessary next steps to enter back into the program.

While at this program, the Alzheimer's association presented some great information that I would like to share with you all, including a website where you can access caregiver resources, a free app to download that can be a resource to the caregiver, whether it is family or a nursing staff member.
